Dear friends,

Lent begins February 14 and many opportunities for spiritual growth will be offered during Lent. Please note the list of activities in this newsletter and take advantage of them. We will also be handing out a booklet of daily Lenten reflections by Henri Nouwen entitled *Christ Our Hope* and a Lenten calendar of activities for children. Please pick up your copies in the back of church or the parish office.

Our annual process of selecting a trustee and some parish council members will begin the end of this month. Please prayerfully consider serving and/or nominating others for these leadership positions.

Some recent social media postings commenting on Pope Francis calling for a change in the translation of "lead us not into temptation" from the Our Father have been harsh. I was appalled by some of the nasty comments made, obviously by people who are not fans of Pope Francis. I would like to explain where Pope Francis is coming from.

First, it is important to understand that translating is tricky. Just translating the words might not convey the original meaning: it is a balance between being faithful to the words but also faithful to the idea BEHIND the words. For example, *pro multis* in Latin is translated *for many*, if you just translate the words. But Latin does not have the article "the" and the meaning of *pro multis* is better translated as *for the many (people who exist)* or simply *for all*. When it is translated *for many*, our understanding in English is that there are some who are not included (someone might ask, "Am I one of the many or not?") So while *for many* is an exact translation of the words *pro multis*, it gives an impression that is contrary to the Church's teaching that Christ died to save all people.

With that understanding and example, let's look at "lead us not into temptation." That translation implies that God COULD lead us into temptation and we are asking Him not to. That is not the God that Jesus presents to us. The Spanish translation that I have used for many, many years is *no nos (us) dejas (let) caer (fall) en tentación (into temptation)*. This is similar to the French that Pope Francis refers to. I suspect he chose French rather than Spanish so that people would not accuse

him of favoring his native language. *Do not let us fall into temptation* is a translation which makes more sense in terms of our understanding of God.

But beyond explaining the translation issues, I would like to look at the dynamics we get into as human beings, a dynamic made worse by social media. We tend to receive information according to our world views: prejudices, preconceived ideas, etc. That is normal. But we need to be careful, we need to realize and remember that we do that, and we need to step back and look at the facts and issues, apart from our subjective positions. So in the example above, though a person might not like Pope Francis and the direction he is leading the Church, it is important to look at the issue on its own merits. In other words, "IS that a better translation, really, or not?" rather than just concluding "there Pope Francis goes again, trying to undo everything that has been in place for centuries."

The difference is important: the first seeks truth and the positive; the second simply dismisses and gives no chance for growth. We see how damaging and divisive that can be on social media.

As we approach Lent this year, let us resolve to be people who try to advance truth and unity by looking past our biases and world view to examine what is involved in an issue, always seeking and being open to the guidance of the Holy Spirit.

We hear so much rhetoric in the news and from politicians about what it says in the Bible these days. Every time I hear that reference, I have come to expect Doom, Gloom, and Damnation. It seems to me there is a lot more in the Old Testament to complain about than what I grew up hearing about.

As a Catholic, I think my identity is much more rooted in the New Testament. As a follower of Jesus, I feel this is where I am supposed to live my life. As a teacher, ‘Let the Little Children come to me,’ (Mt. 19:14) is certainly more appealing than, ‘An eye for an eye’ (Exodus 21:24). In my Catholic identity, I want to be known for my discipleship, a follower of Jesus. I want to be the one who gives away my second coat, shares my food, ‘Loves my neighbor as myself.’ The politicians and others who use the Bible for condemnation and justification of their own theories, have certainly not heard the words of Jesus, ‘He who is without sin among you, let him cast the first stone’ (Jn, 8:7).

‘My hope is in Jesus Christ, who stretched out his arms and died that I might be saved.’ Aren’t those the words to a hymn or a prayer that resound from my childhood? I must hold with my identity as a Catholic, ‘But in your hearts revere Christ as Lord. Always be prepared to give an answer to everyone who asks you to give the reason for the hope that you have. But do this with gentleness and respect’ (1 Peter 3:15). I must find my Catholic Identity in the New Testament with my Brother and Teacher, Jesus Christ. God Bless You this Lenten Season.

## **News from our School Wauwatosa Catholic**

The New Year brought in a busy month for WCS! We celebrated Catholic Schools Week, launched a new program, honored our Students of the Month, and ended the first semester!

We launched the Student Ambassador Program. Students from grades 5-8 were eligible to apply for the position. Two students from each of the grades were chosen for our inaugural group. They filled out a lengthy application, and interviewed with a team of parishioners from both St. Pius X and St. Bernard. The Student Ambassadors will have the opportunity to represent and promote WCS. The interviewers had a most difficult job, because as one of them noted "I would like to honestly choose all of them. Our Ambassadors were introduced at our monthly Awards Program.

The Learner Profile attribute of the month of January was "Balanced." The program, held on January 24, honored students from grades K3-8, as well as parishioners from St. Pius X and St. Bernard who participated in the interview process. After the Awards portion of the program, the Student Ambassadors were introduced.

We are now winding up our celebration of Catholic Schools Week. The week began with a Mass at both parishes. Students from WCS participated in the 10:00 Mass at St. Bernard and the 10:15 Mass at St. Pius. Students were lectors, read the petitions and were involved in the Bell Choir and the Children's Choir. It is truly uplifting to see how very special it is for our students to have the opportunity to participate in the Liturgy. They take this very seriously. Every single one of them spent much time practicing, and on Sunday did a fine job! Mass was followed by an Open House at school from 11:00 am to 1:00 pm. ## From the Justice and Peace Commission

We have two upcoming events that we hope parishioners will join in:

First, On **February 25<sup>th</sup>**, during Fellowship after the 10:15 Mass, we will host a visit with the Kurban Family. Three years ago, they arrived in Milwaukee from Malaysia, where they had lived for years in a refugee camp. Their home country is Burma (Myanmar) and they are Rohingya Muslim. As you may have heard in the news, Rohingya Muslim have been horrifically treated by the majority group in Burma.

St Pius parishioners were instrumental in the family's move to Milwaukee: welcoming them at the airport, cleaning and readying their flat, providing clothing, furniture, and household goods, and helping them move into their first home in Milwaukee. Much has changed since that time: their fourth child was born (she's now 2 ½), the older children are enrolled in a wonderful school and are truly bilingual, Dad has a job, they've moved into an apartment building that houses other Burmese people and so have a community of support.

There are a handful of parishioners that maintain regular contact with the family, and we thought it was time to bring them back to Pius for another visit. Though Mom and Dad still struggle with English, they always express much gratitude to us.

The aid the family received when they first arrived in the U.S has stopped and yet their expenses have not. We will be putting out a wish list of needs for the family, mostly in terms of clothing items for them. If you have any of the needed items, please bring them to the back of church before Feb 25<sup>th</sup>, so they can be sorted and given to the family when they come. Also, if you'd like to make any financial contributions, we will have a box at fellowship. Committee members have purchased uniforms for the children for this school year. As they continue to grow, this money will go toward new uniforms along with books and other kinds of learning items.

Then, on **March 11<sup>th</sup>**, we will host our first MINI GREEN SUMMIT in the cafeteria from 11:30 – 2:00. We will have representatives from area organizations and businesses there to provide information for us on how we can continue and increase the ways we CARE FOR OUR COMMON HOME. More information will follow, but please plan to join us on March 11<sup>th</sup>.

## Archdiocesan Stewardship Appeal

This year's Archdiocesan Stewardship Appeal follows the theme, "Decide to Lead." We make a leadership decision when we decide to support the appeal. The Archdiocesan Appeal contributions are restricted to four important areas of ministry: Serving Families in need through Catholic Charities; Strengthening Parishes; Supporting Catholic Schools; and Formation of Priests and Parish Leaders.

In Serving Families in Need, the Catholic Charities provides Adult day Care, Behavior Health Therapy, Legal Services for Immigrants, Pregnancy and Parenting Support, and the all-important Catholic Campaign for Human Development and Catholic Relief Services which promote the dignity of every human person. Part of this ministry also maintains the Communication Ministry which promotes information and inspiration to live Our Faith, including publication of "The Catholic Herald."

By Strengthening Parishes, the Archdiocese continues its commitment to every individual Catholic and families by providing parishes with priests and well qualified leadership to lead Catholics in prayer, worship and sacraments. Training is offered for all levels of parish leadership. Part of this ministry includes the John Paul II Center for The New Evangelization which coordinates archdiocesan efforts to call Catholics to a deeper relationship with Jesus, making them evangelists and disciples, leading all to God, and showing the face of God to all.

With Supporting Catholic Schools, we impact the future of our Faith by providing a Catholic education for 30,210 students from three-year old kindergarten through high school in 107 schools. These schools educate our children academically, emotionally and spiritually. Through Brew City Catholic, Theology on Tap, and Campus ministries, the archdiocese supports an additional 30,000 young men and women on their faith journeys.

By Forming Priests and Parish Leaders, the appeal supports St Francis de Sales Seminary in training young men from the dioceses of Green Bay, LaCrosse, Madison, Superior, Joliet II, and the Archdiocese of Milwaukee in priestly formation. Currently, 57 men are enrolled in this program, with an additional 17 men enrolled in the Diaconate ministry formation program. In this Lenten series, Br. Silas Henderson, SDS, will explore the life of Jesus and the demands of discipleship. This is a four-part series divided into two sections (if you can't attend both sections, feel free to attend what you can. The opening session—the first section—will be a mini-retreat (Saturday, **February 24th** from 9 am to noon) and will focus on what it means to be a disciple and how the Season of Lent can help us focus our attention on becoming a more faithful follower of Jesus. The following sessions (Saturdays - **March 3, 17 and 24**, from 9 am to 10 am) will focus on stories from the Gospel and how these give us insights into what it means to follow “the Way” of Jesus. This is a wonderful opportunity to focus on the richness of the Season of Lent, as we look forward to the great Feast of Easter.

All are welcome to attend either or both sections. The cost of the mini-retreat is \$10; coffee and refreshments will be provided. The materials fee for the second section (the three sessions) is \$10.

# INVITATION TO DISCIPLESHIP

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## **\*STEWARDSHIP OF LENT\***

Ash Wednesday, February 14<sup>th</sup>, begins another Lenten season. Lent is sometimes viewed as a tedious time, merely temporarily forsaking pleasurable activities, counting the days to Easter when the activities can be resumed. There's likely a little of that in each of us. For the most part though, hopefully, Lent may be seen as an opportunity to enter into a deeper relationship with our Lord, to reflect on His love for us and how we might grow in our love for Him. It is an opportunity to discern any negative patterns in one's life that may be hindering that mutual love and replacing them with permanent affirmative ones. In a sense, one might also consider Lent as an opportunity to nurture a Stewardship lifestyle by reviewing how one utilizes the gift of time, time spent on various media devices vs. time in prayer; reviewing the utilization of one's talents, for self-centered opportunities vs. helping others; reviewing the utilization of one's treasures, for one's own consumption vs. donating to help others in need.

How one will effectively live out the coming Lenten season is an individual decision. The following is offered only as one possible approach.

**Listen:** spend quiet time in prayer and reading scripture; take advantage of the Eucharistic Adoration occasions being offered in our parish.

**Experience:** challenge yourself to find new methods of serving others. Many faith-based organizations, including our own parish, are always seeking volunteers.

**Network:** find a prayer partner with whom to share your Lenten experiences, the successes as well as the failures; How the Lord is working in your life at this time. Pray daily for each other and hold each other accountable.

**Thank the Lord:** for His love, for providing an opportunity to grow in knowing, loving and serving Him in this life, for the gift of Lent.

## **\*PRAYER INTENTIONS\***

We encourage all parish members to include the following intentions in your daily prayers during the coming month.

*That this season of Lent will be a time of greater prayer, fasting and generosity in almsgiving for all members of our faith community.*

*For the grace to see the presence of Jesus in all the circumstances and situations of our life.*

*For peace in the world and for the protection of all those who risk their lives to defend that peace.*

*For all the sick and shut-in members of our faith community and for all the intentions on our Wailing Wall in the rear of our church.*
