Dear Friends,

The summer has flown by quickly and here we are, close to the beginning of another school year and a new cycle of parish meetings and activities. I hope your summer has been restful.

Monday, August 20, is the feast of St. Bernard and Tuesday, August 21, is the feast of St. Pius X. May these saints bless our communities and our cooperation in the mission to make Christ known to all the world.

Religious Education and Youth Ministry will be starting up shortly. Religious education classes, held at Christ King, will end at 10:15 and beginning September 16 our later Mass will be at 10:30. That means religious education families should be able to attend Mass at Pius Saturday evening or 10:30 on Sunday. More volunteers are needed for these programs. Please consider this vital ministry to our youth. It is challenging to run programs for three parishes: I thank Samantha El-Azem and Sarah Daszczuk for their dedication and efforts on behalf of our children and ask your prayers for the blessings of the Holy Spirit on these ministries.

As I mentioned in an earlier communication, our principal, Heidi Hernandez, has taken a position in another city. Interviews have been held and a follow-up interview with one candidate is scheduled. Meanwhile, everything is in place for in-service with the teachers this week and for the school year to start, as normal. All teachers but one are returning so that is a big help. Please keep the process of finding the right principal in your prayers.

As we did last year, we ask you to reach out to family or friends who do not attend church regularly and invite them to the Grass Mass (Mass in the courtyard) and the luncheon afterwards (those guests will receive a complementary ticket to the luncheon). Sometimes, all someone needs to return to church is a personal invitation, especially from someone who shares how the community and Mass influence their life.

This year we will continue our focus on building a stronger personal relationship with God, a relationship that translates into reaching out to others. Near the end

of the month, there will be an evening reflection for all parish members who serve on councils, commissions, or committees. In Advent and Lent, we hope to have something for all parishioners. And I will have this focus in mind as I write bulletin letters and homilies. A strong, personal relationship with God assures that we will bring His goodness and kindness to others. And that is what it is all about!

May the Lord bless our community as we begin another year of supporting each other through prayer and example. I thank you for all you do.

**Parish Financial Statement**  
**Dean Weyer, Director of Administrative Services**

The latest financial news from our parish is attached to this newsletter. The financial report is for our fiscal/accounting year just ended June 30th, 2018.

Higher than expected utility expenses (\$9,029 over budget) and unplanned building and equipment repairs (\$19,276 over budget) were significant contributors to a bottom line deficit of \$28,540 for the year. **This has all but depleted our cash reserves.** With a balanced budget planned for this year, meeting our stewardship goals will be critical to providing the income to pay the bills. Note that increased rental income this year is in large part offset by our share of facility improvements for this new tenant (Kingdom Prep).

In addition to the normal expenditures as reflected in the attached financial statement, there was additional spending from restricted funds that are not reflected in the income/operating statements: We invested \$3,230 in new microphones for church. Monies from the brown "Take Pride in Pius (B&G Fund)" envelopes were used to patch/stripe the parking lot (\$9,102), for repairs to the retaining wall and sidewalks (\$2,615), and (\$565) in misc. other repairs.

Thank you to all who are up to date on your pledge! Statements will be mailed in early September only to parishioners who are behind on their pledge for this year. I thank you for supporting our mission and ministries.

**From the Justice and Peace Commission**

As summer months wind down, the Justice and Peace Commission will get back to the work of addressing issues of our world. We continue supporting the St. Vincent de Paul meal program on the 4<sup>th</sup> Monday of every month, collecting food for the Tosa Food Pantry, and supporting the work of Bread for the World, an organization that advocates for fair and just distribution of food domestically and internationally.

Environmental work, stemming from Pope Francis' Encyclical "Caring for our Common Home" has hopefully become a way of life for all of us as we continue to support Better Earth Recycling and eliminate more disposable products from our homes and at Sunday Fellowship. As a parish, this year, we will join with the Milwaukee River Keepers to adopt and clean up a portion of Milwaukee riverways on a regular basis. We're already planning for the next Mini Green Summit in April of 2019 and hope to have new organizations and ideas represented there.

The Justice and Peace commission financially supports local, national and international causes with the funds collected in the baskets at every weekend Mass. Locally, we join other parishes to support Greater Tosa Interfaith, an organization that assists the elderly in our community so that they may remain in their own homes as they age. Along with your donations of specifically requested items, those funds also help Repairers of the Breach (a daytime homeless shelter) continue their mission.

We also support Pax Christi, a national organization that works to promote peace in the world and the Greater Milwaukee Free Clinic that provides health care to Milwaukee's needy. Internationally, our relationship with our sister parish continues and throughout the years, we have provided safe water for many villages in Tanzania with the Living Waters Campaign.

As the world and its multitude of problems confuses and concerns us, we are challenged to find our way as disciples of Christ. Supporting the work of the Justice and Peace Commission in whatever way you are able ... with your involvement in our activities, with your tangible and financial donations, with your thoughtful consideration of the social issues we address, and of course with your prayers...is one way to live as a disciple of Jesus. Thank you for your support!

## Living Waters – A Call to Help Our Tanzanian Sisters and Brothers Update:

Thanks to your generosity we once again raised enough to build **six wells** for the people in rural Tanzania. A total of **\$32,633.** was donated. The amount over \$30,000 will be used to repair wells already dug. We also keep this account open all year in case you want to continue to donate. That way we have a small amount to begin next year's campaign.

Two of the six wells we donated this year have already been dug and are in service. Sue Haertel, SDS, had the chance to visit some wells in July when she was in Tanzania. Here is her account of this experience.

Once again this summer I had the opportunity to return to Tanzania to teach English to the Salvatorian Sisters from throughout Tanzania and the Congo. This year I traveled with Sister Barbara Reynolds, SDS. The class went extremely well. There is a great interest in learning English and in joining the class and English proficiency is increasing!

Once the class was over, we traveled to Morogoro in central Tanzania to meet with James Nyangas, president of SWLD (Safe Water for Life and Dignity) who took us to visit eight villages with wells we've donated over the years.

I wish you all could have been there to share in the joy of the villagers as they celebrated their wells. Each well not only provides water, but new hope and a change in the life and prosperity of the village.

In the past I've mentioned that with a source of clean water, water borne diseases decline, there may be enough water to irrigate more crops and the village thrives, and the girls may be able to attend school instead of walking for water all day.

This year I learned two more important ways a well in a village changes lives. Sometimes there are two villages who seek water from the same water hole. This can bring strife or fighting as the villagers share the water, wait for the water hole to refill. If there is a well, people from both villages can use the water and peace reigns.

I also learned that when there is a well in a village, there is more marital harmony and fewer divorces. The women can be in the village during the day helping to care for the children and there is more family time. This leads to peace.

We are giving more than water, we are giving peace, health and happiness! Well done St. Pius X parish. Thank you for your generosity!

A highlight was visiting a village and being present for the installation and celebration of one of our wells donated this year. The entire village gathered and we watched as they tightened the bolts and put the pump parts together. Finally it was ready and they began pumping. There was great anticipation as the pump handle moved up and down. Will there be water? Yes! All at once fresh, clean, plentiful water poured out. The people sang and cheered. A woman standing next to me said with tears in her eyes, "I am a mother, a grandmother and a great grandmother. I never thought in my life I would see this in my village. This is a dream come true."

## **\*BUILD A RELATIONSHIP WITH JESUS\***

What might this "personal relationship" be compared to? Sister Joyce Rupp, OSM, offers this idea in her book, Fragments of Your Ancient Name. The poet Rainer Maria Rilke refers to God as :

"You Who Live Next Door."

I have my old ways of keeping you  
From getting too close, from maybe  
Requiring too much from me.  
You can be my casual neighbor  
The one I greet in coming or going  
But not my intimate companion,  
Not in my household or in by bed.  
I keep my distance, lest too much  
Of my hidden self tumbles out.

To have a relationship we need to communicate, to share our lives, to listen. May we not only greet God each day, but welcome him into our lives throughout the day through prayer and service.

Father Jordan, founder of the Salvatorians, mentions in one of his Chapter Talks, "How can you help? Above all through prayer, and trust in God, But with trust alone and your hands stuck in your pockets you won't get far! That puts God to the test. You must do it like this. Yes, everything depends on God, but work as if everything depends on you!" (1897/12/03)

So, let us take time to pray and to listen to God's voice in our hearts, and let us also take action as we work together to bring Christ's love to everyone we meet.
