## A Reflection from Fr. Paul

May is a month in which we honor Mary, the Mother of God. She gave birth to our Lord and Savior and for that she deserves our admiration.

While we can't physically bring Christ into the world as she did, there are at least two other aspects of Mary that deserve our admiration, aspects which we CAN imitate.

Jesus points out the first in His interchange with the person who says to Him, Blessed is the womb that carried you and the breasts at which you nursed. Jesus replies, rather, blessed are those who hear the word of God and observe it. This is something we can do!

Mary seemed to spend quiet time talking and listening to the Lord. We are told she pondered things in her heart. That must have been what she was doing when God presented His plan to her and she said, "Thy will be done." We certainly can spend some quiet time each day, talking with the Lord and then being quiet to listen. He wants to lead us, as He did Mary. We just have to give Him the chance.

The second way we can imitate Mary is shown in the Visitation. Once she heard her older cousin was going to have a baby, Mary immediately left to go and help her. She didn't think only of herself and her good news: she put the needs of another first. We can imitate Mary by responding to the needs of others, the best that we can. When we do that, we ARE bringing Jesus into the world, not physically, as Mary did, but spiritually, as His love flows through us to others.

There is a lot we can learn by reflecting on Mary and her life. As we remember her this month, we pray: *Mary, our mother, help us to bring your Son to the world by bringing His love and concern to others. Amen.*

### Kingdom Prep Lease

On April 16<sup>th</sup> we formally extended our relationship with our tenant, Kingdom Prep Lutheran High School (KP) with the signing of a **new five year lease!** (With provisions for up to three five-year extensions). KP will take on a little more space and we have agreed to invest in a share of some (to be determined) mutually agreed to facility improvements. While there are certainly challenges to having a tenant in the building, we are proud of our relationship with KP and happy for the part that we play in their mission of forming young men in a faith filled environment!

### Financials/Stewardship

We are now almost ten months into our fiscal year which will end June 30<sup>th</sup>. We have been fortunate to be able to efficiently “fix the things that break” and have managed a preventative maintenance program for our HVAC equipment, being able to deter any significant facility expenditures. Financial support is strong from a growing parishioner base. We are on pace to realize an operating surplus for the year in excess of \$75,000. THANK YOU to all who support the St. Pius X Parish Community with your financial support and prayers!

### Love One Another Funds

So far, we have received \$112,798 (of the Pius pledged share \$288,000), earned \$1,200 interest, and spent \$50,543 (most recently \$7500 on our Adult Faith Formation programs and \$11,841 on boiler repairs). The balance of \$63,454 is being held pending expenditure on one of our stated cases (HVAC, roofs, formation).

### Pius Supports Catholic Education

Do you have or want to place your child in a Catholic elementary school? Please be aware that our budget contains funds to financially assist St Pius families who choose to send their child(ren) to a Catholic elementary school at another parish. Pius will cover any school’s “non-parishioner tuition penalty”! Additional assistance is also available for even the base tuition costs.

In addition, Pius families with children attending a Catholic high school are eligible to receive up to \$3,000 per student per year!

### That School Roof

We’ve patched and patched and believe that it’s time to consider replacing it. We’re currently seeking bids. We will NOT need to hold a special appeal, as funds are available.

### Bequests

We’ve been blessed to receive three Bequests this year totaling \$95,953. Our policy, for unspecified bequests is to split them: 1/3<sup>rd</sup> to the Endowment Fund for the long term security of the parish, 1/3<sup>rd</sup> to the Facilities, Buildings & Grounds Fund for the unexpected repairs and improvements that come up and 1/3<sup>rd</sup> to a “Special Purpose Fund” for future facility and ministry needs.

### Mass Attendance

It’s up! We’re seeing numbers at/above pre-COVID values. Easter attendance (454) was up 30%!

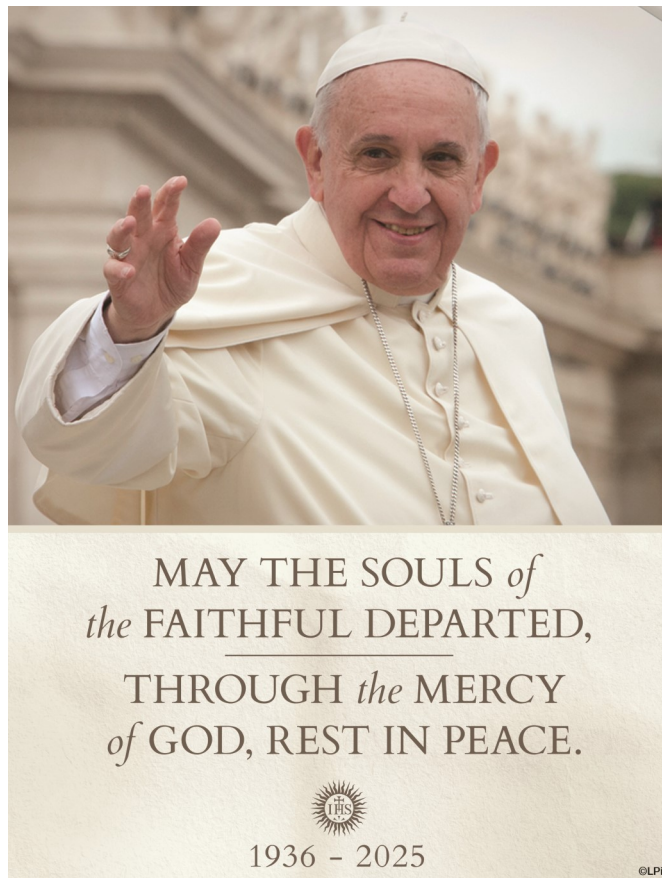
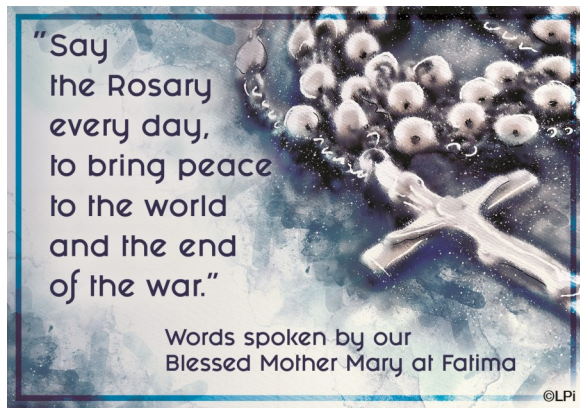

#### Updates to the Website

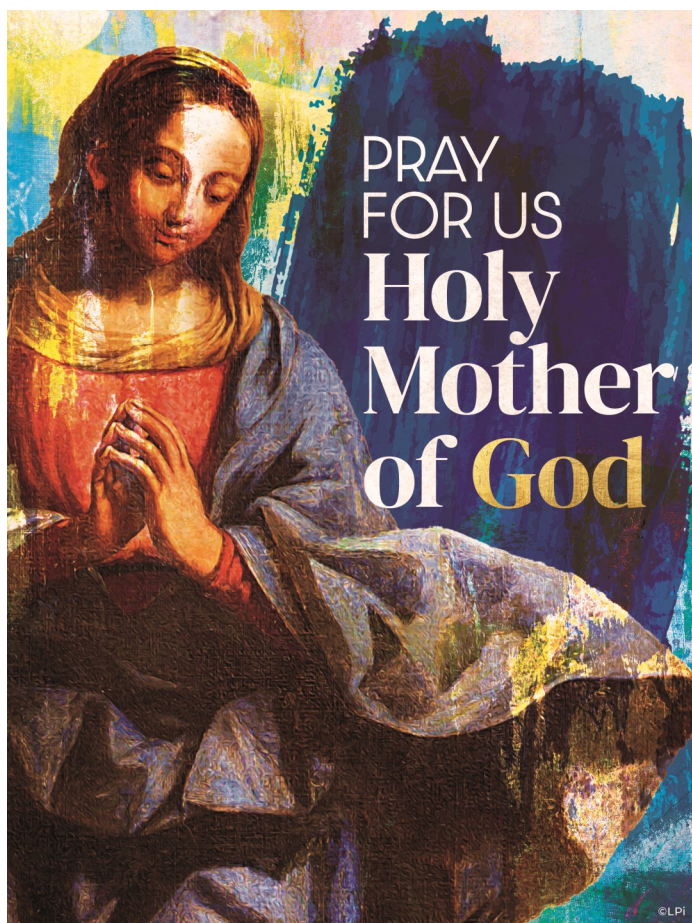

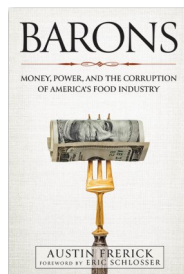
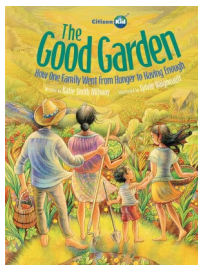
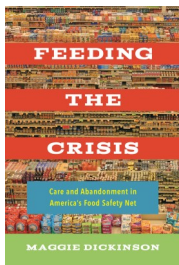
### Tosa Food Pantry Food Drive

### A Message from Tricklebee Café



Tricklebee Café is a pay-what-you-can community café that offers healthy meals, food-service training, and spiritual nourishment. We are a ministry of the Moravian Church in America.

We offer a space to foster community, connections, goodwill, and a love for real food with simple ingredients. By offering an inclusive and welcoming space, we bring health, positivity, and peace to our neighborhood.

By providing fresh, healthy, locally-grown food to anyone regardless of ability to pay, we address food insecurity by feeding the immediate need of hunger, while providing resources to educate and inspire people to make a habit of healthy eating. Access to healthy food helps people to better care for themselves and their neighbors, which heals and strengthens community.

We seek to be a peaceful gathering place in a neighborhood that has experienced violence and neglect. We are a safe, inviting place for neighbors to gather to promote reconciliation and peace. We work to eliminate prejudice and discrimination against the economically and socially marginalized by creating a space where individuals from all backgrounds may gather around the concept of a community table.

Tricklebee Café is part of the One World Everybody Eats Network along with dozens of cafés across the U.S.

We're located at 4424 W. North Ave. in the historic Uptown Crossing District of the Sherman Park neighborhood. Enjoy our plant-based freshly-made soups, sandwiches, salads, baked goods, and hot drinks. Gluten-free options available daily.

Tricklebee Cafe incorporated as a nonprofit Wisconsin business in December 2015, and after a full year of renovating a run-down storefront, opened its doors in November 2016. In 2020, after 4 years of renting the front unit, Tricklebee Cafe was able to buy the entire building, doubling the cafe dining capacity and providing staff housing.

We have served over 100,000 meals since opening.

### Madamu "B" Community Letter

Dear Madam Sue and all,

I am pleased to let you know that SWLD has successfully finished the construction of the St. Pius well in the Madamu "B" community, which is about 40 km east of Morogoro. The well currently serves over 800 individuals; the majority of them are small-scale farmers. Despite having fertile areas for farming, the locals were still living in poverty. One of the contributing factors to villagers' poor living conditions is a shortage of clean and safe water.

Villagers have been without safe and clean water for a long time. They have been using traditional shallow wells, which were unsafe, to obtain water for their households. This has resulted in various health problems and hampered agricultural productivity. Villagers have claimed to have contracted typhoid and other diseases, including diarrhea and cholera, which they linked to drinking contaminated water.

Attempts by the village leadership to get donors to step in were futile as the problem persisted. A few months ago, the village leadership turned to us for help. We really appreciate the St. Pius community for their generous contributions that made the construction of this well possible. On behalf of SWLD and the villagers, I thank you for your outstanding contribution to alleviating poverty among our people.

Now that the new well is working, the villagers are optimistic that having access to clean water will enhance their farming endeavors and improve their quality of life, which will help them escape poverty. We also expect these farmers' health to significantly improve. This development not only meets a critical need but also provides hope for a more sustainable future and better living conditions for their families.

### Alcohol and Cancer

We want everyone to be aware of current research that reports a significant connection between alcohol consumption and the risk of developing several types of cancer.

The more alcohol someone drinks, the higher their risk. Even light or moderate drinking can elevate the risk for certain cancers. Alcohol can disrupt cell cycles, increase chronic inflammation, and damage DNA. Each year about 20,000 adults in the United States die from alcohol-associated cancers. Studies show that alcohol consumption increases the risk of developing cancers of the mouth, throat, esophagus, liver, breast, and colon. Breast cancer is the most common alcohol-associated cancer among women. Colorectal cancer is the most common among men.

Wisconsin ranks third-highest for adult alcohol consumption in the United States and has the highest excessive drinking rate in the country. You can lower your risk by drinking less alcohol or not drinking at all. Communities can create social and physical environments that support people in drinking less alcohol. That is one of the Health Ministry's goals.
