## A Reflection from Fr. Paul

For a family to be able to function, lots of chores need to be done and members have to cooperate to do it all: clean, cook, wash dishes, shop, mow lawn, etc., etc. The parents do a lot of the work, but, as children get older, they begin to take on more and more of the responsibilities.

It is the same in a parish community. We can come on Sunday and participate in the Mass, going back to our daily lives, spiritually refreshed. But, as in a family, there is a lot of work to be done for the Mass to happen each weekend and for the community to continue to exist.

For the weekend liturgy, there are the following ministries that come together to make it happen: altar servers (acolytes), lectors, Communion ministers, hospitality ministers, cantors, choir members, and instrumentalists. Everyone is capable of doing at least one of these ministries. If God didn't give you a good singing voice, maybe you have a good voice for proclaiming the Word of God. If you are too shy to greet people as a hospitality minister, you could distribute Communion. Younger and older members can be altar servers. Fellowship with Cranky Al donuts is a favorite, but we desperately need volunteers to keep it going. We will have a ministry fair the weekend of September 16<sup>th</sup>/17<sup>th</sup> focused exclusively on these liturgical ministries and Fellowship Sundays. Where can you fit in?

Later in the year we will have another ministry fair, focusing on non-liturgical ministries. For the community to continue to exist and to fulfil our mission in the wider community, we all need to contribute. It would be ideal if every parishioner were involved in at least one ministry. As we get ready to start up a new year of parish activities, I invite each parishioner to prayerfully reflect on how you can contribute to the vitality of our community and our liturgical services. Then sign up at a ministry fair or contact the parish office anytime to sign up. Thank you and God bless.

It is hard to believe that summer is almost over, but it is time to get ready for our Welcome Back Mass and luncheon!


### Welcome Back Mass and Luncheon

## Operations & Finance

My comments this month focus on our overall financial status and the fiscal year ending report (next page). I'd direct your attention to columns 3 & 4 for a comparison of the year's planned and actual values. The rightmost column reflects the plan for this new year (July 2023 to June 2024). For the year just completed, we achieved a net operating surplus of \$4,000, which exceeded the plan/budget by \$4,000. Adjusted by the (unrealized) gains from our investments, the actual net surplus for the year was \$53,970. While there were numerous line item variances, the report reflects that most income and expense categories experienced minor variances to the budget.

Coming out of the COVID crisis, our total stewardship income exceeded the plan! Our quarterly reviews reflect that almost all parishioners are meeting or exceeding their pledge values. New parishioners and guests are generous!

You may notice that we still have allocated \$133,500 under the Wauwatosa Catholic expense category for the 2023/24 operating budget. While the school has closed, this next year we needed to allow for possible "closing costs". Also in this category, we made the decision to provide tuition subsidy assistance to our families who will go on to attend another Catholic school. In that scenario, Pius will cover the added "non-parishioner tuition premium" that most schools charge. This hopefully allows our families to be able to afford a Catholic school education while continuing their membership and participation here at Pius. We also continue to offer tuition assistance via your support of the (blue envelope) "Angel Fund". If either of these situations apply to you, please contact me for information on how to apply!

We have no debt. We have a cash balance of \$630,535. While significant, it represents just a little over ten months of operating expenses. We continue to rely on the time, talent, and financial stewardship of our parishioners to sustain our many ministries! The Finance Council is targeting some of these monies for future facility upkeep. While we will be able to use some Love One Another money, our school roof will need replacement in the next 2-3 years, the gym/church roof will soon be over 25 years old, the furnaces aren't getting any younger, etc. you get the point. Each of the roofs will well exceed \$125,000! For now, it is good to have some "reserves" to draw on!

In addition to the normal expenditures as reflected in the financial statement, there were additional outlays from restricted funds that are not reflected in the statement: We collected and sent \$9,044 to our Sister Parish; and \$50,000 was collected and forwarded to the Living Waters Project! (PACT: Pius Parishioners Always Come Through)

Donations to our brown Take Pride in Pius envelopes totaled \$17,864 this year. This "piggy bank account" is used to fund facility, buildings and grounds repairs and improvements not provided for in our operating budget. We were fortunate to only have to make a small withdrawal this year. The fund balance now stands at \$18,087.

Thank you to everyone who is participating in the Love One Another Capital Campaign with your pledges, gifts and prayers (it's not too late to participate!). As of now, we project to receive \$285,000 over these next five years. Our funds are specifically targeted for evangelization outreach, improvements to our worship space and roof/HVAC repairs. We have received our first distribution (\$34,450) and already have a use: a repair to the air conditioning unit will require \$16,550.

We've entered year six of the seven-year lease with Kingdom Prep. Continuation of that mutually beneficial relationship is being discussed, but is not a certainty. That decision will have a significant impact on our budget and financial position going forward.

No word yet from the developer, Cardinal Capital, as to when they will "put a shovel in the ground" on the development in our former parking lot. We have already achieved the financial benefit from the sale of the lot and we continue to be confident that, in the end, this will all work out well for the Pius community.

As I stated earlier; the weekend of September 23<sup>rd</sup>/24<sup>th</sup>, we will have our annual collection to support our new sister parish. After many years of support to our former sister parish in Guatemala, we decided it was time to support a new parish. The advantage of Mother of the Savior (aka Mater Salvatoris) in Nakapanya, Tanzania, is that the Salvatorians organize a trip each year to Tanzania, so there is the opportunity for parishioners to visit and come to know the parish. Our Director of Adult Formation, Rob Hoffmann, was there in July and hopefully, other parishioners will be able to visit in the years ahead!

I worked with the Salvatorian leaders in Tanzania to identify the parish that could most use our help. There are many needs in this parish. How the funds are actually used will be reported to us, as they are spent. Some pressing needs are for the nursery/kindergarten facility, musical instruments for the choir, farm equipment, and facility repairs/construction for their 10 outstations.

God has been very generous to us. I invite you to be as generous as possible in supporting the people of Mater Salvatoris (Mother of the Savior). Thank you.

## Tanzanian Encounter Recap

Fr. Paul mentioned earlier that the Salvatorians offer an opportunity to participate in a trip to Tanzania every year called the “Tanzanian Encounter”. I participated in the Encounter this summer from July 2<sup>nd</sup> through the 21<sup>st</sup> and was able to visit our new sister parish!

Mother of the Savior parish is in the southern part of the country, about 21 hours from where we were staying in the middle of the country. We traveled in an SUV, driving south through the mountains. The landscape in Tanzania is incredibly diverse. We initially flew into the old capital, and most populous city, Dar Es Salaam, which sits at sea level on the edge of the Indian Ocean and is surrounded by rolling hills. In the north of the country is Mount Kilimanjaro, the tallest mountain on the continent of Africa. Just below it are

the vast savannas of the Serengeti region. To the west is Lake Victoria, the largest lake in Africa.

Further south the country transitions into every landscape imaginable. The drive to our sister parish took us through beautiful, ever-changing mountains with trees that I can only describe as looking as if they had been drawn by Dr. Seuss. A paved road rings the country of Tanzania, while many of the interior roads are unpaved.

The entrance to Mother of the Savior starts at the paved road and proceeds for 5 blocks, in a straight, but bouncy line through a residential neighborhood (unpaved roads of dirt are notoriously potted, creating a very bouncy drive).

Every resident on that stretch of road smiled and waved hello in response to my smile and wave. Finally, at the end of the road, we arrived to our sister parish church and property.

The property is as diverse as the southern Tanzania landscape. There you will find the church proper, an unused parish office building, a small agricultural animal building, a rectory building, a kindergarten building and a seminary complex. In the process of construction is another agricultural animal building and a bazaar courtyard area in front of the church. **But a parish is more than its infrastructure, it’s the people.**

We were greeted by the church choir and children singing outside of the rectory as we exited our vehicle. You will be able to see and hear these beautiful songs during our introduction sessions September 23<sup>rd</sup> & 24<sup>th</sup>.



After a heavy breakfast (the Tanzanian hospitality is overwhelming) we moved into the church for Mass. The day was very special, as a parishioner who recently was ordained a priest was celebrating his first Mass at his home parish. Through the open windows we could hear the choir outside as they processed their way into the church. The Mass was celebrated by five priests and multiple religious brothers and altar servers.

Not only did music fill the church more times than what we are accustomed to; the choir also dances to the songs! (Videos of parts of the Mass will also be available to you.) During the presentation of the gifts, a procession of 30 people moved up the aisle dancing, bringing gifts, and singing. The incense was abundant. When the Mass concluded, I thought we had been there for an hour and a half, but I was astonished to discover it had actually been three hours! After Mass we enjoyed an abundant lunch in the rectory. The next day we returned to meet the kindergarten children. We presented them with soccer balls from our parish and arts and crafts items from Wauwatosa Catholic School.

And so we concluded our first visit to our new brothers and sisters on the other side of the world. Following this article are some interesting facts of the community and Tanzania.

## Fast Facts: Our Sister Parish

### Outstation

In poorer countries where there are no paved roads, no public transportation, and few cars, parishes consist of a main church and numerous outstations. The priest travels periodically to these small communities to celebrate the sacraments and religious instructions are held there. Our sister parish has 10 outstations that are anywhere from a half hour to two hours away. These outstations can be as simple as four tree columns and a roof to a brick/block structure, while some have no shelter at all.

### Catechists

One definition of a Catholic catechist is to catechize (teach) the faith of the Catholic Church by both word and example. Our sister parish has 12 to 16 that work at the outstations and two tending the home parish.

### Congregation

200 parishioners at the main church and another 600 combined at the outstations.

### Choir

30 adult and 15 child members

### Kindergarten

Four teachers and assistants educate approximately 25 students.

## Fast Facts: Tanzania

### Tanzania

Tanzania is an East African country. It sits on the Indian Ocean coast and is south of Kenya and north of Mozambique.

You may already know of some places in Tanzania:

### Mount Kilimanjaro

In the north on the border between Kenya and Tanzania is the tallest mountain on the continent of Africa, Mount Kilimanjaro. It is a dormant volcano and besides being the highest in Africa at 19,341 feet above sea level, it is the highest single free-standing mountain above sea level in the world. The author Ernest Hemingway published a short story about the mountain in 1936 called "The Snows of Kilimanjaro".

### Serengeti

This geographical region and ecosystem, just south of Mount Kilimanjaro, has a protected area of approximately 12,000 square miles, hosts the second largest mammal migration in the world, is one of the Seven Natural Wonders of Africa and is renowned for its large lion population.


### Lake Victoria

Bordering Tanzania is one of the African Great Lakes (yes, they have great lakes also!) Lake Victoria is the largest African lake by area, the world's largest tropical lake, and the world's second largest freshwater lake by surface area after our Lake Superior. In 1935 C.S Forester wrote a book called the African Queen and in 1951 John Huston directed a film by the same name. The climax of the story takes place on Lake Victoria.

### Zanzibar

This island off the coast of the mainland of Tanzania is a historically famous Arab island and archipelago referred to as the Spice Islands due to their production of cloves, nutmeg, cinnamon and black pepper.

**Population:** 62 million  
(according to the 2022 national census)

**Size:** 365,756 square miles  
(about the same size as Egypt)

### National Language:

Swahili  
You already know some Swahili if you are a fan of the movie Lion King. The Swahili phrase "hakuna matata" means without trouble, "Simba" means lion and "rafiki" means friend. English is used in foreign trade, diplomacy and higher education.

### Government

A unitary dominant-party presidential republic or a presidential constitutional republic, it is a de facto one-party state with a democratic socialist party. The country has not experienced major internal strife since its independence in 1964 and remains one of the safest and most politically stable countries on the continent.

### Climate

Average daytime temperatures vary from 70° to 90°F, with a moderate 50° to 60°F at night. Summer usually lasts from November to March, and during this time there is always a chance of afternoon showers. Winter is from June to October and is the dry season with comfortable temperatures.

### Religion

Christianity is the largest religion in Tanzania, with substantial Muslim and animist minorities. (What's animist you ask? Animist is the belief that objects, places, and creatures all possess a distinct spiritual essence.)

### Christianity

Christianity was introduced in the 16<sup>th</sup> century by the Franciscans. Spiritan missionaries arrived in the area in 1868, the Holy Ghost Fathers in 1863, the White Fathers in 1878, and the Benedictine Monks in 1887. These Religious Orders did the preliminary work of spreading Christianity throughout Tanzania. In 1955, the American Salvatorians came to work in Tanzania, and they, and numerous other groups, organizations and Christian faiths helped spread the Gospel to the people.

### Catholicism

In 2020 the Vatican estimated that approximately 30% of Tanzania is Catholic. There are over 12 million Catholics in the country. There are 34 dioceses, including seven archdioceses.
